An initial purchase of additional hotspots and data plans by the Hormel Foundation ensured internet access for students and families across our community. Grant dollars secured by Austin Aspires allowed us to extend the data plans through Summer 2021, build a free tutoring program, and hire a Tech Navigator to support families as they work through distance learning.

Mother Teresa said, "I can do things you cannot, you can do things I cannot; together we can do great things." That is the true spirit of collective impact, and we see it repeatedly in the work that we do in our community daily.





∠020 has been a year unlike any other. This past year, COVID-19 has provided us with unique opportunities to partner with community organizations, families and students in new ways.

Community partner support and the collective impact model brought grants to support distance learning efforts and the continuation of the backpack program to provide meals to students. Additionally, as a result of receiving dollars from the state of Minnesota during this past year, our expanded team has connected with and supported students and families in ways we weren't able to before.



Examples of the supports that our navigators provide include helping families find dental care for a youngster, fill out preschool registration paperwork, connect the family to a healthcare provider and so much more!

other group in our community. As a result of education partner collaborations and community focus groups with families and students, Austin Aspires leveraged grant dollars from the State of Minnesota to hire two bilingual navigators to support Hispanic males in grades 7-12.

Teresa Lugo and Jesus Alvarez have a primary focus to work with families and students to remove obstacles that may keep them from graduating in four years. Their work includes connecting students with additional academic support as needed, serving as a liaison between school and family, and helping these students realize their potential and opportunities through college visits, intramural activities and leadership experiences.

Working with educators and partners in our community, Teresa and Jesus have already made a multi-generational impact on not only the students they are working with, but the community of Austin as a whole.

High school graduation rates are a data set used to ensure students in Austin are career and college ready. Two years ago, education leaders in the community identified an eye-opening gap in Austin graduation rates - Hispanic males were graduating at a far lower rate than any
